Black-eyed Susan



Trees



Chokeberry

Blooms in mid to late spring, fruit in late summer into early fall.



Common Elderberry

Blooms in late spring into early summer, berries in late summer into early fall.



Eastern Redbud

Blooms in early spring.



Shrubs



Common Ninebark

Blooms in late spring or early summer, berries in late summer and early fall.



Gray Dogwood

Blooms in late spring, white berries in the summer.



Nannyberry

Blooms in spring, berries in the winter.



Serviceberry

Blooms in early spring, berries in early to mid-summer.

Black-eyed Susan

Blooms in early to late summer.



Blanket Flower

Blooms in early to late summer.



Butterfly Weed

Blooms in early summer to early fall.



Canada Anemone

Blooms in late spring and throughout the summer.



Joe Pye Weed

Blooms in mid-summer to early fall.



Purple Coneflower

Blooms all summer.

Bluestem Grass

Blooms in late summer. Seeds for Birds.



Switch Grass

Blooms in mid-summer. Nesting for Bumblebees and seeds for Birds.
